THE PARISH EUCHARIST ON EASTER DAY

WELCOME

Welcome to Saint Andrew's. Worship has been offered on this site since at least the twelfth century.

Eastertide begins with Easter Day, the Sunday of Sundays, and extends into a fifty day season of joyful reflection on the resurrection of Jesus. The Gospel readings at the Sunday Eucharist give full place to the events associated with the resurrection, recording the appearances of the risen Lord and the 'I am' sayings of St John's Gospel.

The miracle of the resurrection lies not only in the triumph of Jesus over death, but also in the inner experience of the Christian who is dead to sin and has risen with Christ in baptism. Eastertide is the traditional season for baptism, and so from Easter Day to Pentecost we say the Apostles' Creed at the Sunday Eucharist, the ancient form of profession of faith which is made at baptism.

Forty days after Easter we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension of our Lord, and then on the fiftieth day, at Pentecost, the Jewish Feast of Weeks, we welcome the coming of the Holy Spirit, through whom we experience the presence of the risen Lord in our lives today.

Gold or white vestments are worn during this festive season, and the Paschal Candle, which stands next to the altar, is a symbol of the light of the risen Christ, which shines in the lives of his people. The acclamation 'Alleluia' is constantly repeated at the Easter Eucharist, and proclaims the joy which the resurrection of Jesus brings to the whole world.

First Reading

Acts 10.34-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles


Peter began to speak to those assembled in the house of Cornelius. 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and

in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 15.19-26

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians

If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death.

This is the word of the Lord.

Gospel Reading

Mark 16.1-8

The Lord be with you

 - + Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?' When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, 'Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you.' So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.



The funeral of David Small R.I.P. will take place on 10th April at 11.30am in church followed by refreshments in the church room.


Tea on Monday and Knit & Natter will meet on Monday 15th April from 3pm – 4.30pm in the church room. Check noticeboards for future dates.
